

# What is community engagement?

Community engagement is the process of working collaboratively with community members — be they library customers, residents, faculty, students or partner organizations— to address issues for the betterment of the community. (From ALA)

# Community Engagement Exercise

- What does your organization do?
- What demographic/s does your organization primarily serve?
- What are some goals your organization has?
- What are some things your organization does well or is most proud of?
- What are the goals of your organization?
- Is there anything you feel you might not have enough of that is preventing you from achieving those goals?

What does it mean to be community-led?

- Learning about the needs of the community you are trying to build a relationship with.
- Letting the community/organization tell you what they need.
- Making relationship building a priority.
- From the Working Together Project-Community-Led Libraries Toolkit:
- "Librarians have important skills and information to share with low-income communities. The community has important knowledge of itself. The effort in this project will be to take a community development approach to putting library skills at the service of the community by working with them to link library services to community understanding of its needs."

- Knowing your community
  - What services/businesses are in your community?
  - Which services (grocery, doctor etc) are easy for people to get to?
  - Which services are harder for people to get to?
  - Which non-profits are in your Town?
  - Which businesses are in your Town?
  - Which demographics does my community primarily consist of?
  - What schools are in my community?
- How do I gather this data?
  - Look at the Canada Census
  - Town Website (living here section)
  - Google search
  - Asset Mapping (walking around community, how far away things are)

- Types of Community Engagement in Libraries
  - **Outreach:** Delivering a message out in the community that the library believes to be important.
  - Consultation: Consists of getting information on what the community wants or needs. (surveys, focus groups)
  - Social/Community Development: Libraries sit as service provider partners at the table during community undertakings, such as the development of community-wide crime reduction strategies, literacy initiatives, or early childhood education strategies.
  - Community Development in a Library Context: Working directly with marginalized community members/groups to plan library services. Strives for meaningful community member engagement in library services.


